President's Message:

The second of ACDA "Purposes" is to foster and promote the finest types of choral music (to provide artistic and spiritual experiences for participants).

I am asking you to send the NEWS editor a title, or two or three, which your singers have found to be particularly meaningful perhaps a year or more after performance.

A listing of such reactions would be useful in encouraging choral director-trainees, and those new in the profession, to evaluate repertoire more carefully; it would also furnish aid and comfort to experienced directors.

Well-trained singers will learn and perform whatever is put before them. Two or three years later, we sometimes are privileged to hear from them about certain works which impressed them deeply. I believe we should pay careful attention to such impressions.

To help start your contributions, I will report numerous comments by my alumni on Beethoven's ELEGISCHER GESANG (Elegy, in English and German from E. C. Schirmer with string quartet) and some selections of Britten's CHORAL DANCES FROM GLORIANA (Boosey and Hawkes). Neither are difficult but are expressive settings of worthy texts.

It is tremendously encouraging when college students will tell me about something from their high school musical experience which made a lasting impression. Almost invariably, it is a work from the "clasical" repertoire. I hasten to add that I include in this category many works of proven value which are only a few years old.

I believe you can make a real contribution to ACDA by adding to this list - and if we get 200 votes for the Hallelujah Chorus from MESSIAH, so much the better.

The 200th Anniversary of the U. S.

Although our Centennial celebration is still a couple of years away, perhaps our budgets can be made to serve us more efficiently if we begin the acquisition of repertoire for that celebration soon. Certainly we should become increasingly aware of the many facets of American music (besides Billings and Ives) which are available for our consideration and performance.

Black composers and arrangers have contributed a rich heritage of choral music to the mainstream of American music, a considerable portion of which is respected and loved by American directors. Works of H. T. Burleigh, Jester Hairston, William Dawson, R. N. Dett, John Work and Lena
McLin come readily to mind. However, there are choral works of other Black composers which deserve consideration and performance by our groups.

The Choral Journal has published articles which furnish information and insights on some of these selections. I refer you to Choral Music by Black Composers by Robert Herrema (TCJ, Jan. '70) and to A Select List of Choral Music by Black Composers by Dominique-Rene de Lerma (TJC., April '72).

These articles list difficult works by Carman Moore, Olly Wilson, and my graduate school classmate T. J. Anderson; less difficult selections by Undine Moore, Dudley Archer and Norman Merrifield. Works reflecting Black ethnic style are included among the selections of Lena McLin, Mary Lou Williams, and John White. Other Black composers such as Ulysses Kay give us works with few. if any, ethnic overtones.

de Lerma, who is Director of the Black Music Center at Indiana University, Bloomington, has been involved in annual Black seminars "to identify biographically all Black composers, and compile as exhaustive and detailed a bibliography of their compositions as can be secured."

The Kent State University Press has published a transcript of the first seminar, <u>Black</u>

<u>Music in Our Culture</u> (1970) and, perhaps by now, transcripts of the '70 and '71 seminars, <u>Reflections on Afro-American Music</u>. I believe that these can be ordered from the KSU Press.

The editor would appreciate receiving for publication reviews/reactions to any choral works of Black composers with which the membership has become familiar.

Copy-deadlines for news, reviews, articles, article-ettes for the final edition of the NEWS for the year will be May 6th. How about writing something for a GUEST SPOT?

THE EIGHTH ACDA OF OHIO CONVENTION/WORKSHOP:

Lanny Hisey of Alliance High School and Bruce Browne of Mt. Union College are already working on our Eighth Convention/Workshop to be held at Mt. Union August 6-9. Current plans will include the annual large-work sing by the membership and daily reading sessions of a variety of choral works, some with instrumental accompaniments. If there is sufficient interest, one session will be devoted to the works of Ohio composers. Interested ACDA members are urged to bring copies of a best-loved or most successful number to direct. People-to-People Goodwill tour of Western Europe, sponsored by People-to-People International. A special invitation has been extended to Pres. Morris D. Hayes to organize a group from ACDA to go.
