WE DEPEND ON VOLUNTEERS for all ACDA work. Write to Pres. Williams and tell him what you can do best. We use many reading session directors, panelists, accompanists, planning committees, and need help on all the jobs that go with putting on a workshop or convention.

Invite your choral colleagues to join ACDA. How else will they learn of this opportunity? Details on last page this issue.

A good composer is your best authority in teaching excellent singing-musicianship-expression. Mozart will solve problems for you; the music of third-rate composers only creates problems. BRAVO to chairman Lanny Hisey for a whole year's work, and to our host Bruce Browne.

Dr. Daniel Moe, composer-conductor now at Oberlin College, gave us four great sessions. Several large works (Haydn, Monteverdi, Stevens, Bruckner) and many of his own compositions provided material for demonstrations on conducting and interpretation--a wise and distinctive balance between basic techniques and artistic qualities. Dr. Moe enlisted the aid of trumpeter Dr. David Baldwin for sessions involving instrumental accompaniments; Dr. Baldwin is now on the faculty at the U. of Minnesota.

Reading sessions - always important to our conferences - were conducted by John Drotleff, Howard Whitmore, Lowell Unger, John Wrabel, Kay Sittig, Ron Kenreich, John Williams, Charles Carey, Sam Taylor, Louise Bingham, John Elliott, and Phillip Crabtree. Each director provided his own music and gave us an admirable variety of selections and interpretations.

The annual Large Works Sing was led by three past-presidents: the Mozart Requiem was directed by John Van Nice, Byron Griest directed the Magnificat by Pergolesi, and George Wilson did

the Creation by Bobrowitz.

Lawrence Tagg moderated a panel on teacher-training. Participants were Loren Veigel, a Mt. Union student; Lourin Plant, Wittenberg U. student; Dennis Keller, a Mt. Union graduate with one year of teaching; Howard Whitmore, with five years' experience. The lively discussion combined our student attitudes with comments from members of varying experiences.

The Canton Civic Opera Choir, directed by William Hamilton, provided our principal concert event. This is a truly outstanding community group with a long tradition of performances

including stage productions.

The first half of this concert was first-rate concert singing: music by Hassler, Haydn, Morgan, Kopylow, Beck and Burleigh...and a very effective performance of God's Trombones by Johnson/Ringwald, although we could not provide the lighting and staging normally used by the choir.

The second half of the concert, with a change of costume, was a fast-moving choreographed series of selections from Broadway musicals. Bill Hamilton is not only a musician but a debonair showman, and the whole ensemble displayed impressive ability in all kinds of music.

The Canton Civic Opera Choir is staging a full production of LI'L ABNER beginning Oct.9. If you live near Canton, better call Bill about tickets at 216/499-5886.

John Williams' session on Warmup Techniques was an appropriate way to begin the final day; he provided considerable material to take home.

Bruce Browne's Mt. Union Master Chorale performed several works to demonstrate the problems of interpretation with varying editions. As a lab ensemble for conducting students, the Chorale then was heard under the direction of three of its members. This was excellent singing and conducting and a fine ending for the convention program.

As is our custom, the final lunch was followed by an Evaluation and Sounding Board, after which the Board of Directors met to begin carrying out the proposals of our membership. This was one of three Board meetings at the convention, plus numerous committee meetings, and I can assure you that plans are well under way for 1974-76 action.

EXHIBITORS on our special Exhibit Day were: old friend and faithful supporter John Stavash, Educators Music Annex, Lakewood; Dr. James McKelvy of the Mark Foster Music Co. in Champaign, Illinois; John Slimak of the Alliance Band-Orch Inc.

The official BUSINESS MEETING produced a Treasurer's Report which indicates that we can continue with operations in the black; Pres. Williams announced coming events (included in this issue); Virginia Heffner reported on the North Central Division convention.

SUMMER CONVENTION (continued)

Each day's program ended - last but not least - with "gemutlichkeit" social hours arranged in a different restaurant each evening. Unscheduled talent was displayed, along with the friendly and festive spirit we believe is a distinctive and important trait of ACDA OF OHIO.

We had excellent publicity in the Alliance newspaper, including a very intelligent-looking photo of our esteemed chairmen Lanny Hisey and Bruce Browne, and a glowing review of Bill Hamilton's choral concert.
