"Live by example: or Reap your Investment"

Are we aware that we are constantly on the podium? Certainly not in a literal sense, but still very much in the eye of all those singers who look to us for musical leadership. Ah! but the leadership (or may I inject the presence of absence of inspiration) does not stop on the podium. We are emulated at every opportunity. Perhaps this emulation is more acute off the podium rather than on. Once they become influenced through the vehicles of rehearsals and concerts, it's certain that they will explore and become influenced by our leisure activities, prejudices, and abilities.

I'm not referring to our personal tastes in food, books or movies, (though they do matter), but to our

committment to musical professionalism. They are bound to inquire into the nature of the person, or more specifically, "what makes them tick?". We do indeed yield a big stick.

So, I implore you to ask, are we anymore confident that we know what we're doing today than we were when we graduated. If you shared my thoughts (I then felt more insecure than at any previous occasion) you questioned the sanity of the institution and program which certified you to become a professional.

Now, it's to you established teachers who represent a vast majority that I direct this question. What have you done since that time to shore up that feeling of insecurity or hypocracy?


Have you settled down only to live with it? Have you forgotten that feeling? I think so, because most of you have done nothing more than to struggle to stay afloat. Be honest - not mad!

When did you attend your last workshop, convention, clinic or concert? Most of Ohio's ACDA'ers would have to turn back several calendars to find the answer. At our last two conventions, a paltry 80 folk attended. At both occasions, 15% of these figures represent new members.

Come on now! Ohio boasts over five hundred members. Where are you?? I've recently attended several excellent, if not superior, concerts only to discover the singers perform almost exclusively to their hosts. At a recent concert of the St. Olaf College Choir (and there can be few choirs to match them), I counted a total of eight members

You can surely recall how you were inspired by the work of one of your music teachers to enter into the profession. What are you doing to restore or regenerate your enthusiasm? The chances are your next source of inspiration will not come from within, but without. You can't receive any unless you invest some of your precious time and energy. But, I'll bet your next rehearsal will be better following a good concert, clinic, or workshop, rather than another night in front of the tube.

Food For Thought

The following letter is reprinted in entirety with the permission of Robert Wetzler at AMSI Publishing.

To All Lovers of Church Music: Greetings!

Boy, do we have work to do! After attending various workshops and reading sessions last summer and fall, one of our prominent composer-friends wrote: "The junk rate is incredible! Has everyone gone bananas?" The whole world of choral music is becoming geared to entertain. Entertain! Entertain!

Schools have gone bonkers over Swing Choirs, with the result that we're rushing headlong toward the day when schools will be turning out a lot of entertainers who could end up illiterate about the classics. Entertain! Entertain! Entertain!

And in church, we're drifting away from the truth that the function of music in worship is not to entertain. The function of music in worship is to edify, to enhance the Word of God. Music is the servant' the Word is the master. The proper focus of worship is God, not man. (I hasten to add that this is not a call for dull church music!)

I have a friend who directs a church choir, and got pressured into doing one of those current sincere-butmindless works that pass for church music. The congregation applauded. Applauded, mind you! Now, I'm not opposed to applause in church if it is a spontaneous response to being edified, but in this particular case the applause was apparently because the congregation felt entertained. Entertain! Entertain!

I trust the world will forgive me for not sharing the current commonlyheld view that all of life is to be entertained. Sometimes I like to drink from deeper wells--to withdraw from the "hype" and ballyhoo--to learn, to cogitate, to think deeper thoughts, to be edified, to listen for that still small voice of God that comes after the whirlwind has blown itself out.

"Gospel" music (I'm not always sure what that means) seems to be the current rage. And much of the music industry is trying to cash in on it. We're getting a paper-flood of third-rate stuff with no real depth of quality in either music or text. But as my composer-friend (the one who wonders if everyone has gone bananas) points out, it's all "so sincere"--one can "emote to heavenly delights." This reminds me of a comment one of my seminary profs once made: "The presence of the Holy Spirit is no excuse for parking your brains!"

Don't get me wrong; I like "Gospel" music at its best. But what bothers me is that whenever some particular style of music emerges as the current vogue, we always seem to get a paperflood of third-rate stuff from publishers. Church music is not ultimately a question of style (I hope we've won that battle!) but of quality within each genre--created to edify rather than to entertain per se. Any style of music at its best is potentially a vehicle for worship.

I think the "electronic church" is doing church music a great disservice when it uses music that is entertaining rather than edifying, in order to attract viewers. Then our good church musicians find themselves under pressure from parishioners (and sometimes pastors!) to present similar slick, hyped-up, professional entertainment in their home churches. Entertain! Entertain! Entertain!

Somehow, let's get people back to understanding once again that somewhere between mindless-emotion and correct-dullness is some excellent church music. Church music should be aimed first of all at conveying the Word of God. If it doesn't do that, it is inappropriate. Buy conveying the Word is no excuse for using any ole lousy music! If the music attracts most of the attention to itself, it is

Tools of the Trade

John Carter

On the assumption that you may be looking for some real quality in choral music, and are weary of searching through all the "pseudo chorals" (i.e. songs arranged for chorus, pop charts and the like) here are some tasty morsels for you and your choir and your audience. Do all three a favor! The "youngest" composition was written in 1695; this is not to say that anything more recent is not worthy, but that I think our choirs deserve to work with early music, which after all, is some of the most sublime to be found in the choral art.

Deus, Miseratur Nostri-Heinrich Schutz (SATB, Alexander Broude AB 742) A lovely polyphonic setting, Latin and English text, moderate ranges, might be excellent contest material.

Non Moriar Sed Vivam- Ludwig Senfl (SATB, McAfee Music Corp. M 1171) This was written at the request of Martin Luther. Long polyphonic lines, cantus firmus appearing in all voice parts. Not easy, but well worth the effort!

Ave Maria-Tomas Luis de Victoria (SATB, E.C. Schirmer No. 2999) Excellent edition by Thomas Dunn of a familiar composition. This work should be in the libraries of all high school and college choirs (and used!)

Tenebrae Factae Sunt-Leonardo Leo (SATB, Tetra Music AB 422)

Dramatic setting, well within reach of church choirs. The edition and keyboard realization are by John Kingsbury.

Ein Feste Burg ist unser Gott-Johann Hermann Schein (SA, Tetra Music

A jewel! Excellent for sopranos and altos of church choir, junior high girls, two soloists, in other words, infinitely useful! Changing meters and charming melisma. Check this one out!

probably entertaining. Music that edifies draws attention beyond itself-to the Word. The church cannot compete with the secular world for entertaining. Nor should it try. That's not what worship is all about.

Current trends are setting church music back several decades. Entertain! Entertain! Entertain!

I hope you will join me in doing whatever you can to re-educate the people. As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord with the best we have to offer in music that is truly edifying and appropriate for worship.

I eagerly invite your comments on this editorial article and I will consider printing well-written and concise remarks in future issues as space permits.

Alleluia-Johann Hermann Schein (SAATBB, Tetra Music AG 400-4)

Schein stipulated doubling voices with trombones on this work; however, it could be performed a cappella. A fine work for a good high school choir or college

Tu Es Petrus-Giovanni Palestrina (SSATBB, National Music RCS 100-9) If you missed Paul Salamunovich at a past summer convention as he worked with us on his edition of this work, take a look at it. It is excellent!

Resonet in Laudibus-Jakob Handl (SATB/SATB, E.C. Schirmer No. 3020) Not truly a two-choir piece, but alternating choirs in four-part writing. An excellent setting of a familiar old Christmas tune.

Two Settings of the 23rd Psalm-Glaude Goudimel (SATB, A. Broude AB 713) The first setting is chordal, with cantus firmus in tenor; the second involves imitation and canon in a simple linear texture. Excellent for church choirs

O Magnum Mysterium-Cristobal de Morales (SATB, A. Broude AB 731) Christmas motet, edited by Walter Ehret. Not difficult, but contains long polyphonic lines, needing control.

Country Diversion-ed. John C. Haberlen (SATB, Mark Foster MF 348) An extended work depicting a day in the life of a Renaissance farmer. Brief solos, instrumental parts. Formed principally around Richard Dering's Country Cries. Purists might object to this "arrangement" of this music from the Renaissance, but a high school madrigal group could entertain any audience with this clever and witty work, using a simple staging and costuming. Take a few moments to look this piece

Thou Knowest, Lord, the Secrets of Our Hearts-Henry Purcell (SATB, A. Broude) Homophonic anthem, in typical Purcell style; a fine piece of music for high school or church choir. This is a very sensitive, introspective work
