President's Letter for Spring, 1982

I am writing this letter having just returned from the first convention of the Central Division in Kalamazoo, and what a convention it was...excellent performing groups, fine clinicians, and best of all a chance to see old friends and make some new ones! Even with terrible weather, we had about 425 registered. I always return from these conventions so "high" and so "humble"...high because I have had such a boost in my choral energy level (especially needed at this time of year) and humble after hearing so many fine choral ensembles, and knowing I have so much work to do with my own groups

If you do not go to conventions, you really don't know what you're missing. In the future, find a way to go. Don't rationalize by saying you can't afford it, or your school board won't let you. Save your money. Convince your school board. You need it. One of the interest sessions at Kalamazoo was on the subject of burnout. As I sat and listened to this session I thought about how valuable ACDA conventions are in helping us overcome burnout. I don't mean to sound simplistic. ACDA Conventions are not going to solve all your problems, but they sure do give you a lift. Plan NOW to attend some of the events mentioned in this letter.

On May 22, the NE region will have a one day session at Cleveland State University. This is open to anyone in the state and will consist of reading sessions and interest sessions on all levels. Howard Whitmore and Ernie Hisey are planning a full day.

Our summer convention will be held August 5-7, at the University of Cincinnati. We will have a featured clinician plus all the resources of this fine school and faculty.

Our OCDA Fall Conference will be called "Fall in the Falls" - October 29 and 30 in Cuyahoga Falls. The theme of this conference will be church music. A planning committee is working on the program now, and if anyone has suggestions or particular topics (within the area of church music) you would like to see discussed at this conference please write or call me at once so it might be considered.

Look what's happening on the National level...Nashville in 1983 with Eric Erickson and the Swedish Radio Choir...Salt Lake City in 1985 with all the resources (including the choir) of Temple Square. You can't say ACDA doesn't think big.

Bill Boggs, our state chairman on student activities is trying to put together a directory of clinicians with topics they can discuss which he will distribute to students chapters. Student chapters are always looking for good programs which won't cost them a fortune. Please send your suggestions to Bill Boggs, 404 Old Village Road, Columbus, Ohio 43228 and he will do the rest.

Let's start a new movement. While at Kalamazoo, someone came to me and said they had just talked to one of the publishers represented in the exhibit area about why they publish so much junk. Of course the answer came back that so many people were buying it. The publishers of this country will never stop publishing trash as long as it sells. It is not their responsibility. Let's not blame them. It's our responsibility. Let's blame ourselves. The solution is simple: If we don't buy it, they won't sell it.

Cincinnati Conference Calls - YOU!

The Ohio Choral Directors' Association will be hosted for their 1982 summer conference by the Choral Department of the College-Conservatory of Music, University of Cincinnati, Dr. Elmer Thomas, head, Division of Ensembles and Conducting. Dr. John Leman and Dr. Earl Rivers will act as Co-Chairman. The conference will run from Thursday, August 5 through Saturday, August 7.

A scintilating program is planned highlighted by the Brahms "Ein Deutsches Requiem", rehearsals, analysis, and interpretation by Dr. Elmer Thomas. There will be 8 reading sessions of new and old music. Members of the College-Conservatory Music Faculty are contributing their various abilities. Dr. Philip Crabtree, Ass. Prof. of Musicology will speak on "The Brahms Requiem". Dr. John Leman, Prof. of Choral Music and Music Education will deal with "Choral Techniques". Dr. James Riley's topic is to announced. Dr. Earl Rivers, Assoc. Prof. of Music, will discuss "20th Century British Church Music". Dr. Karen Wolfe, Ass. Prof. of Music Education, will delve into "Choral Music for the Adolescent".

Many Cincinnati area artists and educators are adding their talents to the program. Mr. William Dickinson, principal for Cincinnati's School for Creative and Performing Arts, will address himself to "Choral Music for Children's Choir". Joan Walton, choreographer of the Cincinnati Univ. Singers will speak on "Staging Techniques for Show Chorus."

Two fun affairs are planned. Saturday noon there will be a Convention Brunch, the cost for which will be included in the Registration Fee. Friday evening there will be a fun-fun-fun supper and Gemutlicheit at Forest VIEW Bavarian Gardens. Oh-h Boy!

Earl and John have done a fantastic job of "pricing all of this right". Registration will be \$12.00 in advance, and you may send it anytime to Earl Rivers attention, College-Conservatory of Music, Cincinnati University, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45221. This will include the brunch. Registration at the door will be \$15. On campus dormitory housing will be available at \$11.00, single occupancy and \$7.75, double occupancy. Hotel and motel listing will be sent if requested. Meals will be available on campus at the following prices. \$2.00 for breakfast, \$3.00 for lunch, and \$4.50 for supper. NEWS OF NASHVILLE March 10-12, 1983

The 1983 National Convention of the American Choral Directors Association will be held March 10-12, 1983 in Nashville, Tennessee. Headlining the convention program will be appearances by the Swedish Radio Choir (Stockholm), Eric Ericson, Conductor; the Atlanta Symphony Chamber Chorus and Orchestra, Robert Shaw, Conductor; an Ecumenical Service; and many Special Interest Sessions on all areas of the choral art.

Thousands of choral musicians throughout the United States and Canada are expected to set a new National ACDA Convention attendance record at Nashville in 1983, and potential convention-goers are urged to begin making plans now to attend - including checking into the considerable 30 percent savings available on excursion airfares.

The offical opening of the 1983 National ACDA Convention is Thursday, March 10, at 8:30 a.m. The closing concert will be at 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 12. A Pre-Convention Assembly of State and Division Presidents and National Standing Committee Chairs will be held Wednesday, March 9, at 6:30 p.m.

The principal performing facility for the convention will be the beautiful Tennessee Performing Arts Center, which houses three Acoustically-superior auditoriums. Convention hotels in Nashville will be the Hyatt Regency, Radisson and Sheraton. Room rates have been projected to range between \$35-\$55 per room per night.

Official hotel registration materials will be mailed to all ACDA members and printed in The Choral Journal in the fall of 1982.

B-W's 50th Bach Festival Features Expanded Program

Baldwin-Wallace College's 50th Bach Festival will be presented May 19 through 22 on the Berea, Ohio campus. This is the nation's

oldest collegiate Bach Festival.

Bach Festival Director, Dwight Oltman, will conduct the festival orchestra and chorus. Internationally-known soloists who will perform at this Festival include: Bruce Abel, American baritone, a member of the voice faculty of Hochschule fur Musik in Stuttgart, Germany; Arlene Auger, soprano from Germany who has recorded more than 50 Bach works; Jan DeGaetani, American mezzo-soprano who has appeared as a soloist with leading American and European orchestras; Peter Hurford, English organist and former master of music at St. Albans Cathedral; Karl Markus, German tenor and specialist in Baroque music; Seth McCoy, American tenor and former Clevelander who studied voice with Pauline Thesmacher; Marilyn McDonald, a Baroque violin expert and Oberlin College faculty member; Doris Ornstein, American harpsichordist; and Mary Squire, American trumpet virtuoso and member of the Baldwin-Wallace Conservatory faculty.

Other events in addition to the Bach concerts, will include Dr. Alfred Durr, acting director of the Johann Sebastian Bach Institute, Saturday, May 22. He will also receive an honorary degree during his visit to B-W.

Later that day, a music critics' panel will take place at 1:30 p.m. with five participants: Paul Hume of The Washington Post; Byron Belt of Newhouse Papers; Robert Finn of The Cleveland Plain Dealer; Ted Libbey of The New York Times and Don Rosenberg of The Akron Beacon Journal.

The Festival begins with an organ recital by Peter Hurford Wednesday May 19 at 8:30 p.m. at the Cleveland Museum of Art, 11150

East Boulevard, Cleveland.

Thursday May 20, at 8:00 p.m. a solo and chamber music recital with Doris Ornstein playing harpsichord and Marilyn McDonald playing the Baroque violin will be presented in the Kulas Musical

Arts Building 96 Front Street in Berea.

Two concerts will be presented on Friday May 21 at 4:00 and 8:30 p.m. in Kulas Musical Arts Building. The first combines the talents of the Ohio Chamber Orchestra and the Festival soloists in a Secular Concert directed by Oltman. The program for this concert will be "Brandenburg Concerto No. 3" by J.S. Bach BWV 1048; "Sinfonia in D for trumpet and strings" by A. Torelli, Mary Squires, soloist; "Concerto Grosso, Op 6 no. 7" by G.F. Handel; and "Coffee Cantata" by J.S. Bach BWV 211.

The second program, a Sacred Concert will be presented by the B-W College Choir, Festival Chamber Orchestra and Festival soloists. Oltman and Stuart Raleigh, B-W assistant professor of voice, will conduct. The program includes: Cantata BWV 61;

Cantata BWV 82 and Motet BWV 225.

During Saturday's concerts at 4:00 and 8:00 p.m. in Kulas Musical Arts Building, the St. Matthew Passion Parts I and II will be performed by the Festival Chamber Orchestra, the B-W college Choir and soloists.




He has been director of music at several churches but is best known for his Boys' Choir and Youth Choir which have performed throughout Ohio and on radio and television.
