

President's Letter for Summer, 1982

The subject of "Membership" comes up at almost every Board meeting and committee meeting I attend. "How do we get new members in OCDA?" . . . this question is asked time and time again. After studying the problem of membership for the past two years I have come to the conclusion there is only one way to get new members and that is the "one to one" approach. I became a member of OCDA because someone told me about the organization and I bet most of you joined for the same reason. OCDA is a small, specialized group and therein lies its strength. Being small our budget is limited. Large publicity campaigns are costly. Mailings are costly. Advertisements in professional journals are costly. There is only one way OCDA will grow and that is by "word of mouth". On occasion I hear someone say "they won't attend a OCDA workshop because they don't "know anyone". I say you never will "know anyone" if you don't attend. I remember attending my first summer workshop in 1970. I came to that workshop alone. I remember meeting choral directors that I was in awe of. I don't remember that anyone went out of their way to welcome me or befriend me but I didn't come to that workshop for that reason. I came because of the program offered. And the program was terrific. I came back. year after year and gradually made many friends through OCDA.

Another excuse I've heard is that there was nothing on a program of interest. Well, I agree, some workshops, conferences and conventions are better than others but in order to get a true perspective of OCDA one must attend OCDA events over a period of several years. The organization is trying to meet the needs of many different types of individuals and in order for your needs to be met you must try to attend OCDA and ACDA events on a regular basis. It's like someone who comes to just one of your rehearsals and goes away saying they didn't get anything out of it.

Let me tell you what I've gotten out of OCDA . . . perhaps you can use the following to encourage a new member: In twelve years of attending Ohio sessions I've experienced such National figures as Jean Berger, Greg Smith, Heinz Werner Zimmerman, Walter Ehret, Alice Parker, Doug McEwen, Paul Salamonovich and Howard Swan. I never had to leave Ohio. I'd say that's a rather impressive list. Besides that I've heard great sessions by Ohio directors including Martha Wurtz, John Carter, B. Neil Davis, Vance George, Daniel Moe, John Williams, John Leman, Bill Hamilton, Earnie Hisey, Earl Rivers, Bill Osborne, Bob Mix, Frank Jacobs, George Wilson, John Van Nice, Larry Tagg and the list goes on and on. I've learned more from those people than I did in college. I never had to leave Ohio. I've heard sessions on: Standard literature everyone should know, music for the immature voice, music for multi-choirs, American music, children's music, treble voices, small church choirs, choral techniques, style and rhythm in the 20th century, voices and instruments, problems of choral interpretations and techniques, rehearsing aleatory and electronic music, conducting problems, sight reading, concert and rehearsal seating, concepts of vocal pedagogy, diction, voice building, warm up techniques, activities for the training choir, adjudication, music in the inner city, handbells, musicals, teacher training, folk instruments, writing

choral arrangements, trends in choral notation, choral festivals... 'I'm not making up this list... these are actual titles of sessions I've heard just at summer OCDA workshops. I've not even talked about the Winter and Fall conferences or the Divisional or National Conventions. I hope the picture is clear. You can get a lot out of OCDA if you attend OCDA events. You must communicate this to directors who are not members. The "one to one" approach is still the most effective and it is up to each of you to try to increase our membership. Please read about the summer workshop in Cincinnati, and the Fall conference in Cuyahoga Falls and bring along a new member or several new members. Have a pleasant summer.


Memos from Maurice

The Write Kind of Teamwork

Ohio's President-Elect, John Carter, and his wife, Mary Kay Beall Carter, former Editor of the Ohio ACDA Newsletter, are not only husband and wife but they collaborate on a full-time basis on musical works of all kinds. They have been writing as a team since 1978 and, in these last four years, they have produced over 300 pieces of music together. John Carter himself is becoming recognized as one of the most productive and skillful writers in choral composition today. Before he and Mary Kay began to write together, he had nearly 200 published works to his credit.

John and Mary Kay write music for choirs of all types and of all ages ... elementary, junior high, high school, college and church. Many of their works are commissioned by various groups across the country to be performed for commemorative occasions. One of the best known of these works, "Yearnings", was commissioned by John Matheny for the Cambridge High School Choir and performed at the Regional Convention of ACDA at Madison, Wisconsin in 1980. This spring, John and Mary Kay wrote a commissioned work for Bill Hamilton's Canton Civic Opera Chorus entitled, "Gift of the Morning". It will be published by Shawnee Press later this year.

As a writing team, the Carters have produced over thirty published compositions, a popular musical for young singers, Wheels, a sacred Christmas musical for children and adults entitled, The Star and the Stable, a children's theatre musical based on the story of Chicken Little and titled A Fabulous Fable of Feathers and Folly, several adult musical reviews on commission, and a sacred opera, Ruth. The opera, which premiered in Columbus in June 1981 has been selected to be performed for the worship service at the National Convention of Federated Music Clubs to be held in Columbus in 1983. The work is scheduled for publication by Beckenhorst Press with a chamber ensemble accompaniment.

John and Mary Kay began their collaboration while they were writing exclusively for Jenson Publications. They now write for several music publishers although most of John's sacred works are published by Beckenhorst Press where he is the Promotional Director. He has recently arranged a group of Rodgers and Hammerstein songs for Hal Leonard Publications and Mary Kay has created four program kits for Hal Leonard using previously published songs and original scripts.


Both of the Carters have conducted clinics in several states and John is a frequent guest conductor for festival choirs. They were recently at Scarritt College in Nashville, Tennessee where John was a featured clinician at the annual SPRINGFEST for church musicians from several states. In June they will be in Ashland, Kentucky where they are conducting a premiere performance of a new sacred children's musical entitled *Everything Under the Sun*.

This musical employs seven compositions from the Beckenhorst Press catalogue and a new original script by Mary Kay.

The Carters are involved in many aspects of music. Together they direct the music program at Reynoldsburg United Methodist Church where they have five choirs and three bell choirs to oversee. They teach several private students and John is also teaching a composition seminar at Capital University this spring. They are recently affiliated with THE SITES OF COLUMBUS, INC., a tour and entertainment organization which features unique people and places in Columbus, Ohio. This spring they were on the cover of Creator magazine and were the subject of a five-page interview where they discussed their work in a church music program as co-directors and their collaboration in producing new musical works. In July and August they will be on the faculty of a Beckenhorst Press seminar at Ohio State University entitled Writing Choral Music for Publication. Gilbert Martin and John Ness Beck will also be instructors in this seminar.

Mary Kay and John together have over thirty years of public school teaching experience and over forty years of involvement in directing church choir music programs. It is this kind of extensive background that enables them to create such a wide variety of musical works and meet the needs of so many directors in so many unique situations. They continue to offer their time and talents to OCDA where we all share a love of choral music ... and choral music is what it's all about!





OCDA Conference on Church Music

Anyone involved in church music will definitely want to attend the OCDA Fall Conference on Church Music, October 29 and 30, 1982, at First United Methodist Church, Cuyahoga Falls. A planning committee under the chairmanship of Dr. Frank Jacobs has created a program which will interest any church musician especially the director with a small church choir.

The Conference will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday with registration, followed by a reading session of SATB literature (both new and established literature) at 7:00 p.m. A Panel Discussion on the Role of the Church Musician and a Large Work Sing follows. That's already a full evening but there will still be time for a Gemuthlikheit.

On Saturday there will be sessions on Children and Youth Music, administration of the church music program, literature for soloists, a session on choirs and instruments, creative use of the hymnal and repertoire for small choirs.

The conference will end by 4:00 p.m. (so church choir directors can get home) and the Pre-registration price for OCDA members will be \$7.00 which includes lunch and Gemuthlikheit. Registration for this conference will be open to non members at a higher price so this might be a good time to interest a church choir director in OCDA. Full information and schedule will appear in a special NEWS Extra in the early Fall.
