

Letter From A Reader

Dear John,

I read with interest your recent letter in the winter issue of the ACDA NEWS. In your message you discussed great music versus popular music in choral classes. You recounted a typical school day in which a student encounters such classes as Advanced Mathematics and then attends choir where there is little cultural growth. I completely agree with your ideals, but find many oversights and much naivete in your analysis.

Let's look at the first question you posed: Why students on the one hand will study Advanced Mathematics and then attend a choir where pop hits are "studied." Maurice Casey asks, "Are we educating or entertaining?" I say we are entertaining! Not that any teacher wishes to entertain. But that is how we are expected to teach by school boards, administrators, and parents. Let's face facts. Society considers choir a frill. We know that it is deemed as such by society because when budgets are cut, music is cut. I know this personally, because I have been laid off of two school jobs due to budget cuts. Stop dreaming! Choir is considered a frill! Society relates to choir as entertainment.

Turn the tables for a moment. If Advanced Mathemathics were considered a frill by school boards then math teachers would be forced to teach how to count change and to add apples and oranges. If choir was looked upon as Honors Choir, then the attitude of parents would be to emphasize the great composers, good technical abilities and musicianship. Sadly this is not the case. We must face up to reality as an association.

Secondly, choir is often kept in school according to the number of students enrolled. Look at my situation. I am now a free lance choir teacher. Mainly I teach at community centers which handle students of all ages and abilities. I am paid by the class where I receive a set fee for so many hours instruction. If I do not have a minimum number of students, my choir is cancelled. Therefore I do not eat. How many students do you think would join choir if I passed out solely Bach and Handel? Keep in mind, I am in this position because of cut backs in public school music programs.

You can call me a "wimp who let's students, parents, and administrators manipulate" me, but I am a "wimp" because I'm trying to eat, survive and pay bills. I need a job to do that, and it means I must accept less than perfect choral practices to get along with the students and bosses. If your job does not solely depend on numbers or you are assured a pay check due to tenure or a yearly, or semi-yearly contract then you cannot understand what it means to have to "sell" choir every registration day for every class in order to eat. I sometimes feel I am more a salesman than teacher.

You tell me to educate. This I try to do with all my heart by slipping in the great masters whenever possible. But students are coming into class with "society's popular values" that are instilled in them from their parents (your generation, John) and grandparents (your generation, Maurice Casey). Because I teach at a Senior Citizen Center as well. I have observed that this popular attitude is not found in people aged in their 70's and 80's. The question: What happened in Maurice Casey's generation that fostered this cancerous attitude against the great masters? How can I change the attitude of three generations?

Although I agree with your ideals John, you must take into consideration the circumstances of all choral teachers in our association. Be aware of the shoes that other music teachers must wear.




MARY FRANCES McCLINTOCK

Bach at Baldwin - Wallace

The 53rd Annual Bach Festival will concentrate on the 300th anniversary of the births of J.S.Bach, G.F. Handel, and Domenico Scarlatti and will feature music from the rare Bach prints and manuscripts held by the Riemenschneider Bach Institute on the Baldwin-Wallace Campus, Berea, Ohio. The Festival is under the direction of Dwight Oltman, who has served in this capacity since 1976. This is the first year the performances have extended from Thursday through Sunday.

Gisela Pohl, internationally known mezzo-soprano, from Leipsig, will make her American debut. Phyllis Bryn-Julson, soprano will be making her fourth appearance; Karl Markus, tenor his third; and Bruce

Abel, his sixth.

Catharine Crozier, a featured soloist with many orchestras and at many international organ festivals, will

be a first time organ soloist at B-W.

John Gibbons, Harpsichord in Residence of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and the New England Conservatory, will make his debut with the B-W Festival. Doris Ornstein of the Cleveland Institute and B-W Faculty will also be featured on the harpsichord. Dr. Gerhard Herz and Dr. Elinore Barber will lecture about the Bach manuscripts and their influence. Stuart Raleigh will direct both the B-W Choir and the Motet Choir.
