The Closing of the American Mind by Allen Bloom is a study of modern education and has a section on the role of music from both a positive and negative attitude. A text addressing the level of contemporary understanding is Cultural Literacy by E.D. Hirsch, Jr. The final two books deal with recent research on the left-right brain theory and how it applies to music education. Rod Eishenberger used Introduction to the Musical Brain by Don G. Campbell in his session at the Miami convention last summer. This book is an excellent introduction to the role of music education as it relates to right brain development. My final recommendation is a paperback by Linda V. Williams, Teaching for the Twosided Mind. In 210 pages she packs enough easily assimilated informaion in a step-by-step program to change your teaching style. Rest, relax and read . . . Enjoy!

I would be remiss if I did not thank Ernest Hisey, and B. Neil Davis, and their excellent committee on behalf of OCDA for producing a tremendous Central Division Convention in Cleveland. Children in Music: A Primary Emphasis at Central Division Convention

The area of Children's Choruses was well represented at the ACDA Central Division Convention recently held in Cleveland, Ohio. Activities included a reading session of

unison, two, and three part sacred and secular literature for children's chorus and a special interest breakfast. The breakfast was organized by Anton Armstrong with special presentations made by Carolyn Mawby and Mark Puchala. Ms. Mawby spoke on behalf of the University of Michigan -Flint Children's Academy Chorus and Mr. Puchala represented the Traverse City Area Public Schools Elementary Honors Choir. Both organized and initiated their respective children's choruses and spoke about the structure, funding, and musical/education thrust of the organizations. The breakfast also served as a meeting ground for directors of children's choruses from the four state division and provided the opportunity to share ideas, raise questions and concerns, and establish a sense of community within this interest area. Diana Leland, ACDA National President-Elect and music educator in the junior high school, demonstrated her interest and support of the Children's Chorus area by being in attendance.

Exemplary performances by children's ensembles were also a significant part of the convention. The Glen Ellyn Children's Chorus under the direction of Doreen Rao performed a varied repertoire of beautifully prepared selections including works by Debussy, Mendelssohn, Willocks, Kodaly, and others. John Uhlenhopp directed the Chicago Children's Chorus Treble Ensemble in a splendid presentation of literature of such masters as Faure, Vivaldi, and Hassler as well as music representative of various ethnicities.

An especially exciting highlight of the children's segment of the conference was the performance by the Children's Festival Choir. A children's treble ensemble from each of the four states joined forces under the direction of Anton Armstrong, choral director at Calvin College and director

of the St. Cecelia Youth Chorale of Grand Rapids. Michigan. The four choirs involved were the Children's Academy Chorus of the University of Michigan - Flint, Michigan, directed by Tim Barlett, the Carl Sandburg College Children's Chorus from Galesburg, Illinois, directed by Steven Jobman, the Evansville Community Children's Choir from Evansville, Indiana, directed by Barbara Matzegkeit, and Pickerington Middle School Choir from Pickerington, Ohio, directed by Carol Huffman. The choirs were well prepared by their respective directors which made the five hours of rehearsal under Dr. Armstrong a most rewarding and productive experience that culminated in an impressive and exciting musical event. Repertoire spanned a spectrum of styles and eras including works by Bach, Praetorius, and Thompson, to contemporary writings by Britten and Jennings. A special feature of the concert was the addition of young instrumentalists on some of the selections. These fine musicians were from the Bay Village Middle School Orchestra of Bay Village, Ohio, and were also well prepared by their director, David Frost. The final presentation in the aesthetically and acoustically gratifying sanctuary of St. John's Cathedral will long be remembered by participants and audience members alike.

Over 250 children were involved in the Central Division Regional Convention. In addition, the sessions pertaining to the elementary and middle school aged singer were very well attended. Both of these statements are verification of the strong interest in this area of choral education and development. ACDA is addressing the concerns of the elementary and middle school choral instructor and promoting music education and performance at this level. We encourage all members involved in this area to support our efforts by attending the state, regional, and national conferences and by taking an active part in the association so that we can better serve the diverse needs of the membership. ACDA is making a strong and visible statement of support in the area of children's choral education and performance as well they should, for it is the future of choral music. Your involvement and input are vital to this essential cause.

Auditions for Urbana Scholarship

Talented vocalists from around the country are invited to audition for Urbana University's Varsity Quartet. The group of four singers will represent the University at school, community, church functions, lectures by the president, and other scheduled performances. Those who successfully audition will travel around the country at the University's expense while maintaining a certain amount of independence from supervision.

Members of the Quartet will be awarded a \$5,000 tuition scholarship. They will also be eligible for any addi-

tional state, federal, or local financial aid.

Auditions will be held each spring on the Urbana University's main campus and members must re-apply annually.

Thomas Lloyd, Urbana University Music Director, comments: "These scholarships for singers who are not music majors are unique in higher education today. At Urbana, a student can prepare for a career, perhaps in business or education, and pay for the degree by singing."

Charles R. Snyder received his musical training at Capital University, Columbus, Ohio, a protege of Ellis E. Snyder. Further study has been completed at Kent State University, the State University of New York and Westminster Choir College, and with Daniel Moe, Clayton Krehbiel, Leland Sateren, Norman Luboff, Helen Kemp and Paul Christiansen. In 1982, Snyder spent a fall sabbatical studying with Christiansen at Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota.

In 1977, following six years as a public school music educator for grades 1-12, Snyder became a staff member at The Presbyterian Church, Coshocton, Ohio, serving as minister of music and education. He has been active in church music leadership positions in the central Ohio area

for over twenty years.

Snyder also is music director/conductor of the Coshocton Community Choir, a group he founded in 1971. The 100-voice, auditioned choir specializes in singing a cappella literature and has also made several appearances with the Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra. The choir's commissioned "Festival Te Deum Series" of anthems is published and distributed by Columbus' Celebrations Unlimited. Early this year, Snyder organized an auditioned community choir for youngsters, grades four through six, and that 30-voice ensemble will make its debut this spring.

Snyder also teaches privately and has been a contest adjudicator, clinician, musical theater director, festival conductor, and since 1977 has conducted the chorus at Scouting's biennial Order of the Arrow national conferences. He has also been a contributor to Reformed Liturgy and Music, the journal of the Presbyterian Associa-

tion of Musicians.







Male Choruses of America

The Associated Male Choruses of America is presently composed of independent male choruses which endeavor to promote and extend the performance and appreciation of male chorus singing among the men of North America. Currently there are 55 choruses in AMCA with 1700 men involved. They are divided into seven districts: Lake Erie District, NY-PA, Greater NY, Mich., Ontario Wisc. - Upper Mich., and Upper Midwest.

AMCA choruses fill many cultural and service roles in their communities. During the year each district holds a "BIG SING" in which each chorus performs alone and joins in a massed chorus performance. The fabulous sound of several hundred male voices is an inspiring experience. This is usually followed by an informal "Afterglow" and often includes workshops for singers, accompanists, and directors

Dwight Oltman, who has served as Music Director of the Bach Festival in Berea since 1976 has added some fine works of Handel to the Bach Festival to be held at the Kulas Musical Arts Building in Berea Friday and Saturday, May 20 and 21. He will conduct "Theodora" Act I at the Saturday 4 p.m. concert and Acts II & III at the 8 p.m. performance with the Festival Chamber Orchestra and the Baldwin-Wallace College Choir.

Women guest artists are soprano Lorna Haywood who has appeared with the Welsh National Opera, the English National Opera, and most of the lyric and concert opera companies in the U.S., and Catherine Robbin, mezzo soprano, who has appeared as oratorio soloist with Boston's Handel Society, both the New England and the Toronto Bach Festivals and has sung with many major orchestras.

The remarkable voice of Derek Lee Ragin, countertenor and male alto, has been heard in England, France, Germany, Austria, Venice, and America, especially with the Washington National Cathedral Choir. In his early days, he attended Oberlin Conservatory.

Glenn Siebert, tenor, has sung major roles with the Hamburg State Opera, the Chicago, the Minnesota, the Baltimore, the Santa Fe, the Pennsylvania and the Rochester Opera Theaters, in addition to performing with fifteen various U.S. Orchestras.

William Parker, baritone, will return for a second appearance at B-W. He has performed in most of the major Bach Festivals in America and in Germany.

On Friday night, Stuart Raleigh will conduct the B-W Motet Choir in Bach's motet: Jesu Meine Freude. The widely recognized authority on both Bach and Handel, Dr. Alfred Mann will lecture at 1:30 on Saturday.
