# President's Letter Winter, 1990

Was there joy, was there confidence, was there beauty, was there love, was there understanding on the faces of my performers, or did most give the impression that they would rather be anywhere except where they were while they were singing?

So many of us direct choirs because of memorable, beautiful experiences in our past...experiences we wish to share with others. Our opportunities to enrich, to teach, to truly educate, to share, to lead in growth are cheapened or lost if we give ourselves over to mere entertainment. And, the members of our groups are the losers.

But...we have in January (from the God Janus who is pictured with two faces, one looking back, the other forward) the chance to begin again, to work for goals and results that may have become blurred in the frenzy of the holiday season. And, OCDA can help! Throughout this newsletter you will find workshops and conferences designed to aid all of us in our very

#### **CUYAHOGA FALLS, OHIO**




## Treasurer

# Did You Miss This One? Tsk! Tsk!

The OCDA Reading Session, held Saturday, Jan. 20 in Columbus, included fifty participants from all over the state.

Twenty-four selections for Women's Voices and eighteen for Men's Voices ranged from works by Bach and Costantine to Ned Rorem for choruses of from two to eight parts. The seven half hour segments were led by Tim Wigglesworth, Frank Bianci, Joe Thrower, Lula Via, Pres. Elect Dick Mathey, and Co-Chairmen Jim Gallegher and Jim Myers, accompanied by Joyce Stonebraker.

A number of publishers provided music for the packets and the clinicians suggested additional titles which met needs similar

to some of the works being read.

An unexpected but welcome addition to the session was an appearance by THE STATESMEN, a twelve voice group from O.S.U. Men's Glee Club led by student conductor, Brian Nabors. The group sang several numbers including a great novelty piece, "I'm a Train", from the King Singers' arrangement.

Perhaps the success of this session will pave the way for similar workshops around the state. (The Junior High session is already scheduled. A brochure is enclosed.)

### Vern Riffe Center



# Were You There?

November 11 saw 120 gather for a first-rate day hosted by Frank Jacobs, OCDA Church Music R&S Chair, at the First United Methodist Church of Cuyahoga Falls.

Ed McClarey presented his Akron State University Madrigal Singers as an example group as he led a most interesting session on conducting techniques and choral tone. We remember well his three "watch words": Posture, Breath, Vowel. Organist Todd Wilson, recently employed by the Church of the Covenent in Cleveland, gave reason to believe that church music in northeast Ohio is better for his having come to our area. His presentation was artistic and scholarly, and his leading of the hymns in the afternoon festival worship was uplifting to all.

Sessions on self motivation and handbell techniques rounded out a day well organized and excellently arranged by Frank Jacobs. The day concluded with a thrilling concert by the Bowling Green State University Men's Chorus directed by OCDA President-Elect Richard Mathey. Fine music beautifully sung and artistically directed made us wish that all of OCDA could have been present. Our deep thanks to Frank go with our urging him to do a similar workshop in the future.
