
Please Pray for Gene!

The George Stone Singers

George Stone has been a member of OCDA for more years than most of us remember. For many years he was head of choral music at Collingwood High School. Only recently has he retired from the job of Supervisor of Music in the Cleveland Public Schools.

Forty years ago George and six friends who were singing with the Cleveland Male Chorus decided to begin a male chorus of their own. They asked friends from all walks of life to join them in a chorus of men who sang "because they loved it". Within six months they tripled their number and had their first paid booking.

So was born the George Stone Singers, a male ensemble that sings all types of music and always greets you with "Hi Neighbor!" The group does shows all over northeast Ohio and into PA, NY, and Canada. Twenty years ago they premiered with ABC's "Monday Night Football". They have appeared at Hoover Auditorium, Lakeside and on WJW's PM Magazine . . . and many other places.

Their accompanist is Ray A. Novotny, the organist and choir director at St. Luke's United Church of Christ. Crandall Stark, their business managers says, "We are always looking for new singers and new places to perform. From 20 to 80 we all have fun because we love to sing and people love to hear us!"

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5 Ohioans In Fred Waring U.S. CHORUS

Ohio will be represented by five singers in the Fred Waring U.S. Chorus Show scheduled for Eisenhower Auditorium, Penn State Univ. on Sunday afternoon, July 22. The successful singers are Any Walker of Williamsfield, Danielle Dachtler of Brunswick, Matt Bogart of Piqua, Todd Immell and Sean Larkins of Washington Court House.

The selected ninety singers from all over the U.S. start rehearsal on Thursday, July 12 and will soon find out this is PROFESSIONAL. Each day is spent in rehearsing, morning, noon, and night, choral and dance numbers. If a singer is lucky enough to win a solo spot there is more rehearsing. In ten days the Waring staff produces a Broadway type show with amateur high school and college singers, complete with fine solos, interesting dancing, and excellent choral singing. During rehearsal days many of their directors come in to watch how the miracle is achieved. They learn this is a labor of love given by Virginia Waring (Mrs. Fred) and some of the original Waring staff. The selected students pay only their transportation to Penn State; all of the other many expenses are paid by sponsors, friends, and angels.

This year they will do two shows on Sunday, July 22...one at 4:00 p.m. and one at 8 p.m. This should take care of the people turned away last year and give more of you a chance to see what can be done when professionals work with your students. Tickets should be ordered from Pete Kiefer, Pennsylvania State Univ. The last news is the contract is complete to tape the show for fall public television release. Watch for it!

Interesting Quotes

From Robert Shaw about Clayton Krehbiel: "Cayton's concept of choral tone was that it began with right notes and good intonation, and might proceed then to explore any colors true to a great composer's style and a good poet's text... or a folk song's broken heart."

From Eva Bohlin, well known director of KOLERNA: "For good choral sound consider placement carefully. Put the sound that you want in the back. Put "solo voices" toward the middle. Put lighter voices toward the ends. Do not have a weak middle. Try people together for beautiful blend and put THEM in the middle."

From Libby Larson: "Have YOU a sense of purpose? Mine is that I want to instill a life long love of, and curiosity about the Singing Voice in as many persons as I can."



Robert Shaw and The Carnegie Hall Workshops

To celebrate the Carnegie Hall Centennial, a series of Professional Training Workshops will be launched during the 1990-91 Season for choral and orchestral conductors, instrumental professionals, and music administrators.

Robert Shaw will conduct the Choral Workshop, Nov. 14-18, 1990. This will be devoted to musicological study, score analysis and editing, and rehearsal techniques leading to a per-

formance of Brahms' "A German Requiem".

Participants are limited to 120 plus the 50 members of The Robert Shaw Festival Singers; in addition 30 Auditors will be allowed. Applications Fee is \$35; Participants, \$325; and Auditors, \$175.

The intensive five day workshop will culminate in a choral concert performance with Robert Shaw conducting, assisted by soprano Sylvia McNair, bass Samuel Ramey, and the Orchestra of St. Luke's at Carnegie Hall on Sunday, Nov. 18 at 3:00 P.M.

March 17-21, 1991 the Hall will offer a workshop for 125 auditors addressing the issue of programming educational concerts for elementary school-children designed for an audience of conductors, music administrators, and education directors. There will be one day of children's concerts plus panel discussions featuring leaders in the profession.

A Contemporary Music Conductors' Workshop led by Pierre Boulez will be held Feb. 20-22, 1991. Then June 3-18 the Chamber Music Workshop, limited to 24 string players and 8 wind players, will train under Violinist Isaac Stern. This is for a selected group of young professional musicians. Applications will be available after October 1, 1990.

Daniel Moe at Chicago

Dr. Daniel Moe of Oberlin Conservatory is the primary director-teacher at Chicago Musical College's annual five day workshop, June 18-22. He will offer 17 hours of masters classes, studying works from early to modern, polishing techniques in singing and conducting, and exchanging ideas about teaching.

Additional sessions will be conducted by Anne Heider (Performing Practices in Early Choral Music), Roger Scanlan (Vocal Health), Don Malone (Electronic Music), and Don Draganski (Music Librarian). Roosevelt Univ. will offer credits for the courses by arrangement.

Cantari Singers of Columbus

Auditions for Cantari Singers of Columbus are scheduled for June 15 through 17 by appointment. Call 614-766-4741. Persons auditioning will be asked to present two works of their choice illustrating contrasting styles, with one in German, French or Italian. The audition also includes vocalizing, scales, sight reading and tonal memory. An accompanist will be provided. Cantari's number of singers is to be increased this year.

Faure "Requiem", Bernstein's "Chichester Psalms", Haydn's "The Creation", and motets by Bach, Brahms, Poulenc, Rossi, and Pfautsch will be featured in the 1990-91 season. Maurice Casey is the Music Director. Casey is a former national president of American Choral Directors and has a great reputation as a singer and conductor.

This season will inaugurate the newly-formed Cantari Cabaret Singers, who will be featured in a concert of light,

The Singers place emphasis on contemporary music by commissioning works of American Composers. Ohio composers are asked to submit quality choral numbers for consideration now and next season. This is Cantari's ninth season of a cappella and orchestra/choral literature.

New OCDA News Editor William Osborne

Bill Osborne earned all of his degrees from U. of Michigan: BM-1959, MM-1960, and Doctor of Musical Arts - 1964. His summer studies began seriously in '53 and '54 as principal bassoonist in the High School, University, and Honors Orchestras at Interlochen. In the summer of '57 he was at Mills College with pianist Egon Petri; in '60 he was at Fontaineblueau with Nadia Boulanger; in '65 and '66 he was at Tanglewood with harpsichordist Igor Kipnis; in '79 at Loma Linda U. with Sir David Willcocks; and in '80 at U. of Oregon with Helmuth Rilling.

As an organist he has played recitals across the U.S. and in Germany, Switzerland, Holland and Australia. He has conducted 450 choral concerts in Granville and on tour with The Denison Singers through 23 states and four European so-

journs. He has many publications and recordings.

He has served Denison Univ. as Director of Chapel Music 1962-75 and chaired the Dept. of Music in 1977-78 and 1981-84. He has 22 theatre productions to his credit. In the spring of '89 he was Senior Research Fellow at the Institute for Studies in American Music at Brooklyn College.

Various other positions include Ass. Conductor and Keyboardist for the Michigan Choral in Europe ('58) and Latin America ('61) and Choirmaster positions in Ann Arbor and Newark. Presently he is Organist/Choirmaster of Trinity

Episcopal Church in Columbus.

He has written many papers and dissertations. Now he is willing to try a new field: that of editing our OCDA NEWS. His success depends upon you, the members, furnishing him stories about what is happening in choral music all over the state of Ohio. He can't write about it unless YOU inform him.
