OCDA ELEMENTARY MUSIC EDUCATORS WORKSHOP

OCDA will sponsor a workshop for the elementary school music teacher on Saturday, February 16 at Capital University in Bexley. The workshop will focus on the practical needs and concerns of the K-6 music teacher who deals with young musicians at a most critical phase of their development. Topics will include: the child's voice (range, care, concerns, the uncertain singer); literature for the young musician; how to plan a children's choir rehearsal that works; games which emphasize a musical concept; and an introduction to the Orff method.

ACDA MEETS IN PHOENIX

Sister Sharon Breden, Publicity Chair for the 1991 ACDA Convention in Phoenix, has furnished the following overview of the event:

The convention will be held in the spacious Phoenix Civic Plaza 13-16 March 1991. Home of Symphony

Hall and newly remodelled convention facilities, the Civic Plaza, with over 300,000 square feet of exhibit and meeting space, will house the concerts, interest and reading sessions and exhibits, although a few events will be held in nearby churches. Convention hotels are within easy walking distance of these facilities.

Highlights of the convention include Margaret Hawkins as keynote speaker and Garrison Kiellor talking about "Choral Music in Lake Wobegon." Helmuth Rilling will conduct a performance of the Bach B minor Mass and lecture on the work as well. Douglas McEwen will conduct a National Community College Honor Choir; a "Consortium of Choirs" will feature four American children's choirs. Elaine Brown will speak at a special Music in Worship program that will focus on the power of music in the contemporary world. Commissioned works by Ron Nelson, Conrad Susa and René Clausen will be sung for the first time at this special session. The Tapiola Children's Choir from Finland, conducted by Erkki Pohjola, will sing a concert and participate in a lecture-demonstration on "The Children's Choir - A New Artistic Instrument."

tioned by tape, twenty from across the USA and Canada have been chosen to present concerts. They represent the full spectrum of choral music, including professional groups. Another twelve choruses will perform in special sessions and programs. Interest sessions planned by the convention committee and chairs of the national Repertoire and Standards Committees cover a wide range of topics, teaching levels and choral concepts.

MUSICA SACRA AT AGE 25

The Musica Sacra Chorus of Cincinnati will celebrate its 25th anniversary with a concert on March 17 at 4:00 P.M. at St. Gertrude Church, Miami and Shawnee Run Roads in Madeira. The program will include Handel's Utrecht Te Deum and Utrecht Jubilate.

Musica Sacra's members come from an ecumenical cross-section of the community, ranging from volunteer church choir singers to professional musicians, Their founder and conductor is Dr. Helmut Roehrig, chairman of the Department of Music at Xavier University. A graduate of the Staatliche Musikhochschule in Frankfurt am Main, he received his doctorate in music from Indiana University in Bloomington.

LEMAN IN THE SOVIET UNION

Dear Fellow OCDA Members:
Following a very successful trip to
Yugoslavia and Hungary with the
Cincinnati May Festival Chorus in
1987 I organized the Cincinnati
International Touring Chorus, which
sang in Europe during the last two
summers. We were the first
American chorus to sing with the
Leningrad Philharmonic and this

summer will be the first American chorus to sing with the Moscow Radio Television Symphony. We will also participate in the 20,000voice Bridges of Song Festival in Estonia as East joins West

The Moscow orchestra has requested a minimum of 100 singers. At present 70 have signed up and I hope that this invitation will result in a superb group of more than 100. The solo quartet of the Haydn Lord Nelson Mass will have a Russian soprano and a bass from the Bolshoi Opera. Tenor and alto will be Ohioans selected by auditions. Other repertory will include Bernstein's Chichester Psalms. Copland's A Lincoln Portrait and 20 Russian and American folksongs for the festival in Estonia. A 100voice ensemble (half of them Americans) will be selected to perform the Rachmaninov Vespers and the Mozart Requiem as part of the final program for the Bridges of Song Festival.

Rehearsals: Scores and tapes will be provided. Those living distant from Cincinnati will learn the music on their own and arrange for periodic trips to a location tba.


