FROM THE PRESIDENT: REMEMBERING ROBERT FOUNTAIN

It was February, and I was snowed in at the PMEA district choral festival. At breakfast, when I asked the guest conductor for his opinion on doctoral programs, he said, "Well if I were choosing a graduate program, I'd want to study with Robert Fountain at the University of Wisconsin." Hmm, I thought, I know of Robert Fountain's work. Hadn't he been at Oberlin? Wasn't it the Oberlin recording of Mozart's Missa Brevis in F major, K. 192 I had listened to so often at Temple University? I remembered loving that sound. He said, "I think Bob is touring with the choir through Pennsylvania next month. You should call him and try to hear them. You won't be sorry you made the effort." I did, and the pilgrimage changed my music-making for-

I had already been teaching for ten years, and knew the work of many fine choirs. I'd heard the Shaw and Wagner Chorales in concert, I'd been to two or three national ACDA conferences, I'd had powerful experiences singing under Robert Page in the Temple University Concert Choir, and I'd heard recordings of most of the major college choirs. But this sound was different.

No choir I'd heard in performance had matched the electricity, the physical energy passing between the conductor and singers, none had this vibrant diction at the front edge of the beat (without being overdone), and most of all, none had this deep core in legato singing—this feeling of line drawn from the center of the singer. In what I later learned was the Fountain tradition, the program, all first-rate repertoire, was memorized by both

singers and conductor. Bach's *Jesu Meine Freude* and Kodaly's *Matra Pictures* remain especially memorable.

It was my good fortune to spend the next three years, five days a week, on the inside of that sound, feeling him develop that tone, watching him reveal a score and its lifeblood. Using the principles of Dalcroze, we stepped out phrases-shaping them according to our own artistic inclinations, moving them through space in order to discover the feeling we sought to convey later from the choral risers. He challenged us to find the core of our spirit, to find the place from which we moaned when in pain, and to sing from the same center of our being. I remember wailing for Absalom in Dinnerstein's When David Heard and pleading for deliverance in Bardos' Libera me. He aroused the thinker and the feeler in each of

While the artist-teacher was truly impressive, the man was even more remarkable. Beyond his infectious sense of humor, he was noble, gallant, honest, kind, generous and brave. Diabetes and arthritis had already weakened his once strong body. (He had told me that before the diabetes had set on, he used to take on two students at once in handball matches.) Now he was never without pain. Despite these deterrents and the cancer and hip replacements that later also challenged his spirit and mobility, he seemed to soar whenever he made music. He looked twenty or thirty years younger. To borrow from a folk singer, "He was an eagle in an old man's frame."

I'll remember his rich baritone voice, his acute sense of intonation, his love of puns, his cocktail piano playing, his imitations of Frankenstein, his wonderful performances of *The Road to Mandalay*, and *The Green-Eyed Dragon*, his sincere investment in my professional growth, and his profound love for his wife Clara.

On one occasion I asked the wife of another choral director for her impression after having met Robert Fountain. She looked away a moment, then her face took on an unforgettable warmth as she said, "You know, he impressed me as the kind of man King Arthur might have invited to sit at the Round Table."
